




What is Family-Centered Care?

VIRTUAL CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL FOR LEARNING PEDIATRIC NURSING

- Family-centered care (FCC) is defined as a collaborative partnership model where families are recognized and actively involved as partners in their child's healthcare.
- Core principles of FCC include demonstrating respect for families, facilitating shared decision-making, fostering open communication, taking a holistic approach to care, and empowering families to take an active role.
- FCC signifies a fundamental shift away from a traditional provider-centered model, where healthcare professionals make decisions unilaterally, to a family-centered model, that prioritizes family involvement and shared decision-making in all aspects of a child's care.











Benefits and Implementation



Benefits:

- improved patient satisfaction and adherence to treatment plans.
- Better health outcomes for children.
- Increased family confidence and coping skills.
- Stronger family-provider relationships.

Implementation:

- Requires a fundamental attitude shift among healthcare providers.
- Needs ongoing education and training to support its implementation.
- Requires strong communication and collaboration strategies.









Core Principles of FCC



- Respect and Dignity: Treating families with courtesy and empathy; valuing their input and perspectives.
- Information Sharing: Providing clear, complete, and timely information in a way families can understand.
- Participation: Encouraging family involvement in decision-making at the level they choose.
- Collaboration: Working together as partners to achieve shared goals.









Effective Communication: Building Strong Partnerships



- Using clear, non-medical jargon.
- Introducing yourself and your role to families.
- Actively listening to family concerns and perspectives.
- Addressing family questions and concerns with sensitivity and empathy.
- Providing opportunities for families to ask questions and voice concerns.
- Sharing information about potential challenges and risks in a way that promotes understanding and informed decision-making.
